Where is the Bromley Healthcare Rehabilitation unit (Foxbury) located?

What time can I visit?

The unit welcomes visitors between 1.30pm and 8pm. We will always try to be flexible depending on individual circumstances.

If you are unable to attend during visiting hours, talk to the member of staff in charge of the unit to arrange an alternative time to visit.

How can I get there by public transport?

Arriving by bus

You can catch any of the following buses: 160, 229, 269, 286, B14, R11.

Arriving by train

Trains travel regularly to Sidcup station from London Charing Cross, London Bridge, Waterloo East, Cannon Street and New Cross as well as Dartford, Gravesend, Slade Green and Crayford.

The hospital is about 25 minutes walk from Sidcup station or you can take a bus or taxi – buses 160, 229 and 286 run between the hospital grounds and the train station.

Is there parking available on the site?

Queen Mary's Hospital has 350 pay and display public parking spaces with bays for people with disabilities outside each main building.

There is a paved area for motorcycles and cycle racks to the left of the main building. Parking at the Queen Mary's Hospital site is limited and can be expensive.

Parking charges apply continuously over 24 hours including weekends and at night. Where possible, it is better to use public transport when visiting someone in the unit.

Is there anything I need to know about visiting the unit?

Hand hygiene

When visiting someone in the unit, always clean your hands using soap and water, or alcohol hand rubs. Do this when you enter or leave a patient's room or other areas of the hospital.

What not to do when visiting someone in the unit

- It is best not to sit on the patient's bed, as this can spread germs. Use the chairs provided.
- Do not put your feet on the patient's bed.
- Do not touch any dressings or any medical equipment they are attached to, such as catheters. This can cause infections.
- Do not use the patients' toilets. Ask the staff in the unit where the nearest public toilets are.
- Do not share property, such as toiletries, tissues or items of hospital equipment, with other patients.

Illness

If you have a cough, cold, diarrhoea, vomiting or any other infectious condition, contact the unit for advice before visiting patients.
